

ASEAN Strategic Framework and Action Plan for Nutrition, 2018-2030

Background

The ASEAN Leaders’ Declaration on Ending All Forms of Malnutrition (ALDEAFM) adopted in November 2017 is the highest level of political commitment to address malnutrition in the region. It affirms the global commitment to ending malnutrition with the UN Decade of Action on Nutrition 2016-2025, Rome Declaration on Nutrition and Framework for Action and the UN Sustainable Development Goal 2, End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture.

The declaration called on all member states and relevant stakeholders to formulate a multisectoral regional framework and strategic plan to guide country policies, interventions and set minimum standards for service delivery, implementation, monitoring and evaluation and promote regional cooperation across ASEAN pillars and across ASEAN Member States.

The framework and strategic plan identifies relevant sustainable development goals to which nutrition targets contribute and are aligned with. As such, the plan subsequently includes formulation of priority nutrition-specific and nutrition-sensitive policies, guidelines, standards and activities identified from the current ASEAN sectoral body work plans and newly-identified activities of priority concern among the sectoral representatives where nutrition perspective and outcomes may be considered. All activities in the plan are deemed critical and timely to operationalize the vision of the ALDEAFM for the period 2018 – 2030.
